BIGHORNSHEEP AND DOMESTIC SHEEP/GOATS

Mycoplasma ovipneumoniae is a bacteria commonly carried by domestic sheep and goats that causes pneumonia in wild bighorn sheep. While domestic animals typically show no signs of the disease, symptoms in bighorn sheep include weight loss, nasal discharge and large population die-offs. Maintaining physical separation between big horn sheep and domestic sheep and goats is the most effective way to prevent the disease as there is no vaccines or treatment for bighorn sheep.

Prevention measures also include but aren't limited to, testing for the disease, keeping domestic sheep and goats away from high-risk areas and the strategic use of nocontact fencing. Government funding is available for producers in high-risk areas to encourage testing and fencing.

ID characteristics: A perennial, drought tolerant plant with an opposite leaf arrangment. Leaves are lance shaped and slightly hairy. Flowers are typically white and small (6-8mm). Stems are bluish green with many branches.
