DECLINE OF GRASSLAND BIRDS

Grassland birds in Alberta are facing a significant decline in the Prairie regions. Since 1970, the populations of grassland birds have decreased by 67%, with species like the Burrowing Owl and Chestnut-collared Longspur being significantly affected. The decline of these birds is attributed to habitat loss and changes in land use, which have reduced the vast native grasslands they depend on. Conservation efforts are crucial to preserving these species and the rich biodiversity of Alberta's grasslands. Native grasslands used for cattle grazing. rather than crop production, can support grassland populations if appropriate management practices are implemented. The MD of Ranchland's Agriculture Service Board is committed to preserving native grasslands. Their suggested management efforts include controlling agricultural pests and weeds as per the Agriculture Pests Act and adopting sustainable land use practices in line with the Soil Conservation Act.

WEED TO WATCH


Blueweed

Echium vulgare

ID characteristics: Blueweed has narrow leaves covered with stiff hairs and dark flecks on their undersides. It has reddish-purple flower buds that turn bright blue upon opening. Stems grow 30-80 cm tall and are covered in short, stiff hairs.
